As we come out of the pandemic, a vicious cycle of demographics and rising wages are aggravating the child care shortage.


## Family child care continues to disappear.

During the pandemic, family-based child care continued its steady downward trend, although emergency grants may have slowed the decline in 2020.

From the survey: Initiatives

- Direct and indirect giving to both FCC and CCC providers.
  - Through loans and grants or by covering expenses directly.
- Community coalitions
  - Projects need their champions, but coalitions are crucial for building relationships *and* harnessing the resources that no one person or organization can provide.
- Pods
  - Gaining in interest, pods allow rural providers to stay small but get the business out of the house.
- Public schools stepping in
  - There are key efficiencies as long as they work *with* existing providers.
- Educating the community on the importance of childcare.
  - Important for community support.
- Spanish-language training & multi-cultural settings
  - Immigrants have huge potential.
- Employers are participating in the solution.
  - They maybe can't solve the problem alone, but they can be a powerful ally in the community.
